

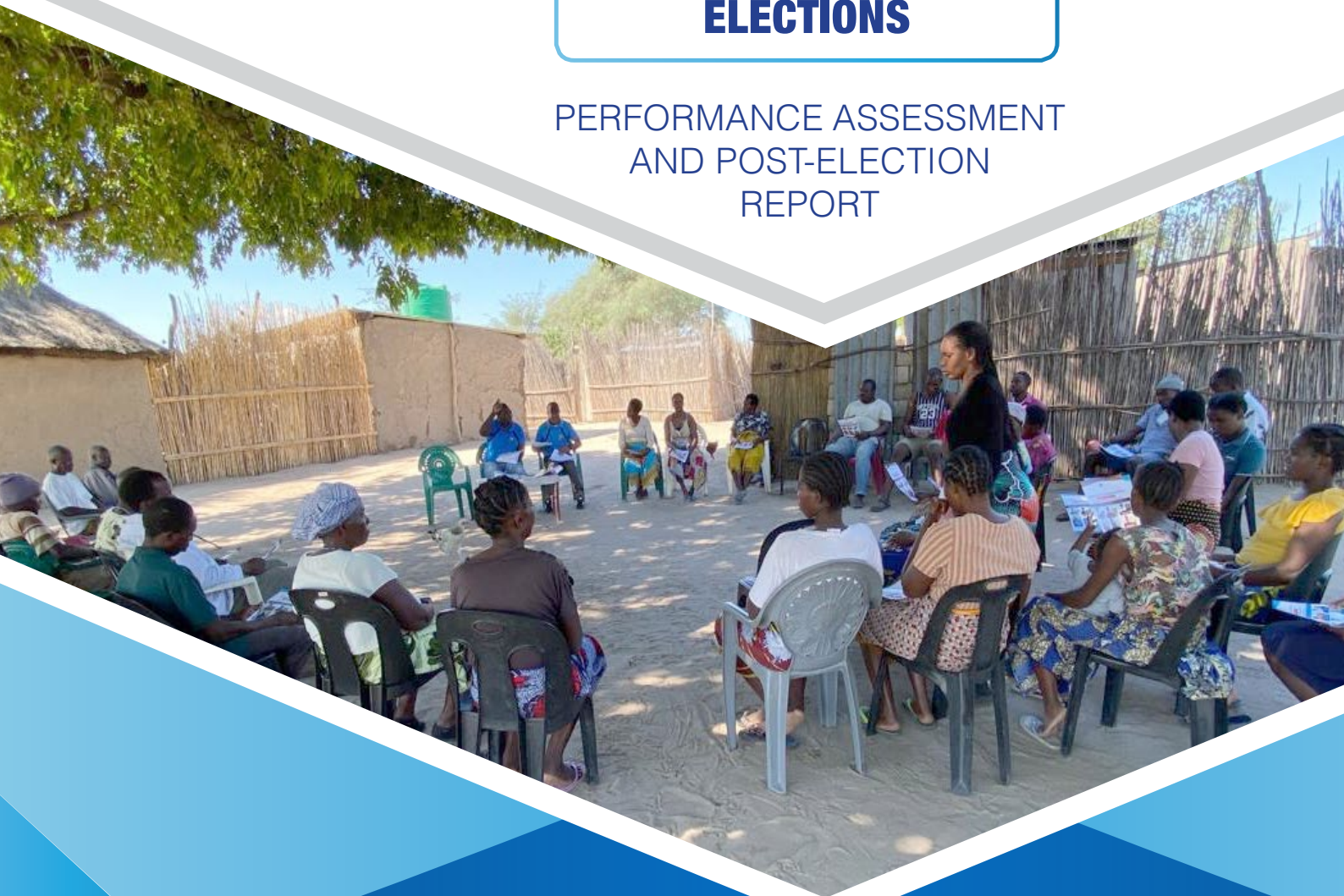

FOREWORD

Fellow Citizens,

As the Chairperson of the Electoral Commission of Namibia, herein referred to as the Commission, I herewith present the Performance Assessment and Post-Election Report for the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly Elections. This report provides an overview of the electoral processes as defined by the electoral cycle which comprises the pre-election, election and post-election phases.

Elections are not complete until all post-election activities are finalised. These include election court challenges and reviews or reforms by the electoral management body, where applicable. The Commission has focused on these activities after the elections; hence this report presents a comprehensive account of the November 2024 elections.

I am pleased to report that the Commission successfully concluded a post-mortem exercise on the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly elections in March 2025. The purpose of this exercise was to reflect on what worked well, identify areas for improvement, and learn from our experiences to develop effective strategies for the upcoming 2025 Supplementary Registration of Voters (SRV) and the Regional Council and Local Authority elections and beyond.

The journey to the 2024 elections was notably significant in our nation's democratic landscape, reflecting the will and aspirations of the people. The Commission marked a notable success in its history by registering 90% of all eligible voters during the 2024 GRV. Additionally, we achieved 76.68% voter turnout during the Presidential elections and 76% voter turnout during the

National Assembly elections. These figures represent an increase of 16.28% voter turnout in the Presidential elections and 15.2% increase in the National Assembly elections in 2024 compared to the 2019 elections.

The electoral cycle officially commenced on 07 March 2024, when the Commission launched the 2024 electoral calendar at the Mercure Hotel in Windhoek. This marked the historic start of the election cycle and provided a platform for electoral stakeholders to come together and receive information of all activities leading up to the election day. This collaborative approach was vital to ensure an inclusive election, and the Commission is pleased that a significant number of stakeholders attended the launch.

In accordance with the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, the Commission recommended key statutory dates to His Excellency Dr Nangolo Mbumba, the President of the Republic of Namibia, which were subsequently approved. The key dates are as follows:

Election Day:	November 27, 2024

Throughout the electoral process the Commission kept the stakeholders abreast of the progress and challenges while receiving diverse perspectives and constructive feedback.

Similarly, the Commission, recognises that an informed voter is a strong citizen. Civic and Voter Education is crucial in ensuring meaningful voter participation and promoting electoral democracy. In line with the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, Civic and Voter Education prepares voters to participate actively in electoral activities.

Subsequently, the Commission employed a robust Voter Education Strategy in preparation for the 2024 General Registration of Voters (GRV) and National Elections, under the Theme “Enhancing Electoral Democracy through Electoral Processes.”

Voter registration is one of the most critical pillars of any electoral process. If an eligible voter is excluded during registration, their right to participate in the election is effectively denied.



The journey to the 2024 elections was notably significant in our nation’s democratic landscape, reflecting the will and aspirations of the people. It is important to recognise that such a substantial undertaking comes with its challenges, especially as we reverted to manual voting using ballot papers.

With the rollout of the Integrated Mobile Registration System (IMVRS), the Commission conducted the General Registration of Voters (GRV) from 03 June to 01 August 2024, both within Namibia and at 35 diplomatic missions. This voluntary exercise spanned over a period of 52 days. The Commission is proud to report that every eligible voter who met the registration requirements and presented themselves at the registration centres, where registered.

At the end of the nomination process, a total of 15 presidential candidates (14 males and one female) were approved to contest on party tickets. For the National Assembly elections, registered political parties were required to submit candidate lists with a minimum of 32 and a maximum of 96 candidates in order of priority. Ultimately, 21 out of the 23 registered political parties were able to submit their lists.


Additionally, the Commission invited observers to observe the elections. A call for observer accreditation was posted on our website and social media platforms from 19 August and closed on 30 October 2024.

In preparation for polling, the Commission established 4 677 polling stations, inclusive of 1 632 fixed stations and 3 056 mobile polling stations. These polling stations were managed by 2 526 polling teams.

Based on the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, polling for the diaspora, sea-going personnel, and members of the security cluster was conducted on 13 November 2024 while the main polling day took place on 27 November 2024. I wish to commend the contributions of all our stakeholders, which were invaluable in fostering an inclusive and peaceful electoral environment.

In conclusion, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to all Namibians for the peaceful manner in which the voting was conducted. From the early hours of the morning until the close of polls, voters patiently queued, showing respect for one another and for the processes implemented by the ECN. Your conduct reflects the spirit of democracy enshrined in our Constitution, a spirit that unites us as a nation.

As we reflect on the outcomes of the 2024 elections, let us remain committed to our shared mission of further entrenching democratic principles, enhancing electoral integrity, and promoting active civic engagement among all Namibians.

OVERVIEW

Preparation for an election is a significant undertaking that requires responsive legal frameworks, adherence to established timelines, and sufficient time for electoral planning and implementation of electoral activities.

The planning, preparation, and conduct of elections globally are based on the three phases of the Electoral Cycle Framework: **the pre-election phase, the election phase, and the post-election phase**. This internationally recognised framework is adopted and applied by all Electoral Management Bodies (EMBs) to manage electoral processes for a given election. The 2024 Electoral Calendar is structured around these three electoral phases, which are detailed below:

Event	Date
Pre-Election Phase:	April 2023 - September 2024
Election Phase:	October - November 2024
Post-Election Phase:	December 2024 - March 2025

Throughout the electoral cycle for the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly (PNA) elections, the Commission employed a structured approach in executing its Electoral Calendar and remained on track for delivery and execution.

To align with this international best practice, the Commission conducted a comprehensive electoral review following the Presidential and National Assembly (PNA) elections in 2019 and the Regional Council and Local Authority (RCLA) elections in 2020. This review formed the basis for planning, preparation, and conduct of the 2024 PNA elections. This framework necessitated the development and adoption of the 2024 Electoral Calendar (EC) providing an administrative and operational framework for planning and preparing for the elections under review.

This document serves as the Performance Assessment and Post-Election Report for the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly elections, which were held in November 2024.

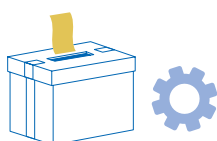

CHAPTER 1

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Performance Assessment and Post-Election Report for the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly (PNA) elections is a statutory requirement under Section 116 of the Electoral Act (herein referred to as the Electoral Act). This section mandates the ECN to conduct a performance assessment for any electoral process and publish a post-election report concerning that election.

The Electoral Act, No. 5 of 2014, as amended, specifies the content that must be included in the post-election performance assessment report. The report should cover the following issues:

- a) Constitutional and electoral matters
- b) Systems and logistics, including infrastructure
- c) Training of staff members or temporary electoral officials and their performance
- d) Voter and civic education
- e) Voting processes and analysis of results
- f) Recommendations for amendments to electoral legislation
- g) Any other matters deemed necessary by the Commission

The Post-Election Performance Assessment Report must be submitted to the National Assembly. The Chairperson of the Commission is required to do this within six months after the election. The Act also stipulates how the Speaker of the National Assembly should handle the report. The Speaker must initiate discussion and consideration of the report in the National Assembly.

Furthermore, the Speaker is required to refer and distribute the report to the President, Chief Justice, Chairperson of the Electoral Court, Chairperson of the Magistrates' Commission, and Chairperson of the Law Reform and Development Commission. The report should also be made available for public inspection. Section 116 of the Act is intended to enhance accountability, build confidence in the electoral process, and strengthen democracy.

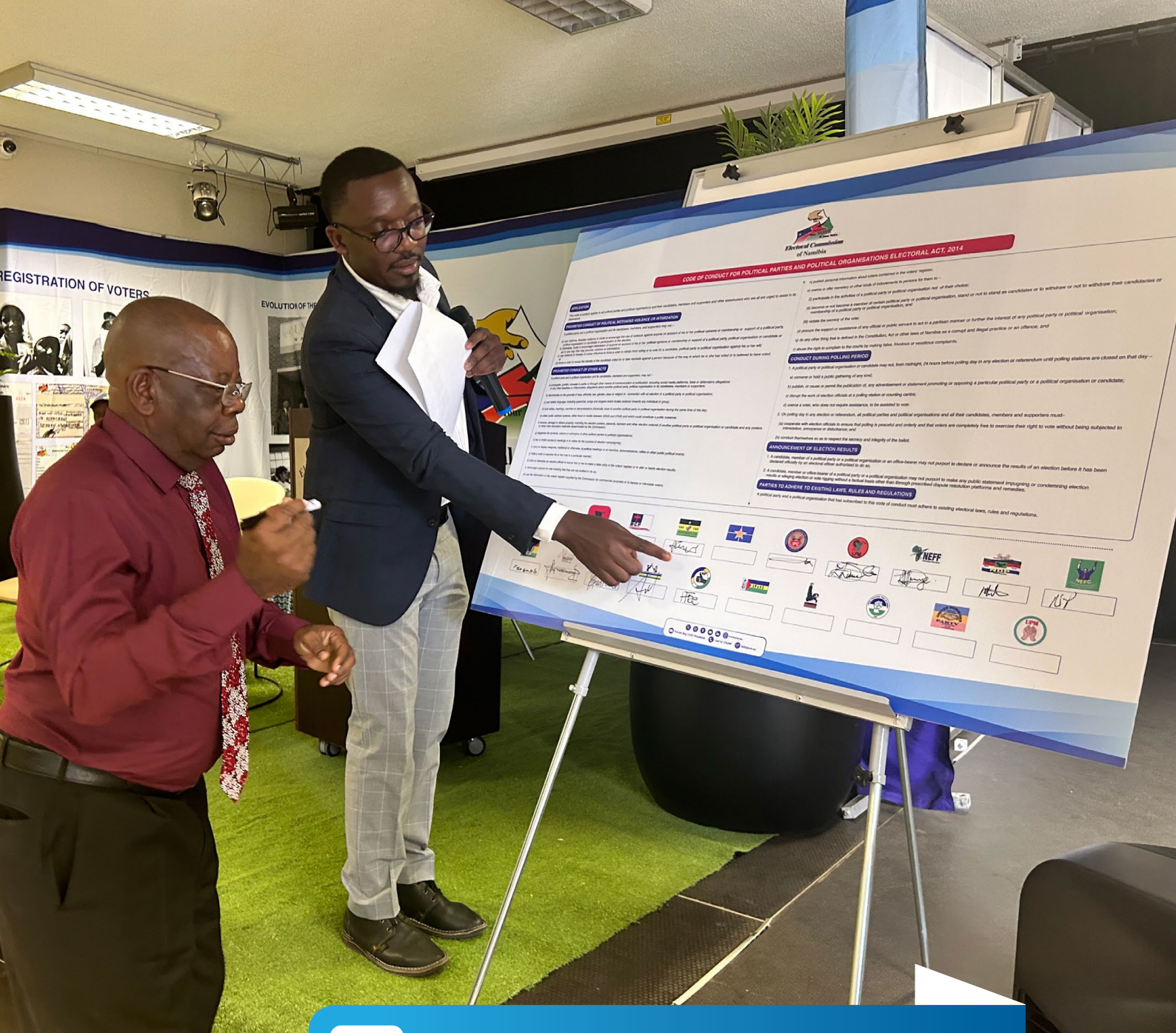


CHAPTER 2



PRE-ELECTION PHASE

The pre-election phase of the electoral process is described as the period prior to polling day. To assess the pre-election phase in its entirety, this section gives a brief assessment of the legislative framework governing the PNA elections, the electoral system, and election reforms undertaken to provide a scope under which PNA were conducted. Additionally, the chapter includes a review of the voter and civic education activities, stakeholder engagement, election administration (including logistics and facilities), human resources recruitment and training, and the process of conducting the GRV.



2.1 LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK



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2.1 LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK

The Constitution of the Republic of Namibia and the Electoral Act of 2014, Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, provide the legislative framework for the conduct of elections in Namibia. Under the Legislative Framework, matters related to the Constitution, legislation, electoral system, and the Code of Conduct are considered.



2.1.1 Constitutional Provisions

The Constitutional mandate of the ECN emanates from Article 94B of the Namibian Constitution. This Article establishes ECN as a constitutional body, exclusively mandated to direct, supervise, manage and control the conduct of elections and referenda, subject to the Constitution.

2.1.2 Electoral Framework

The 2024 PNA elections were conducted in accordance with the Electoral Act, No.5 of 2014 as amended. The Act serves as the primary law governing all aspects on the management of elections in Namibia. It provides for the rights to vote, the conduct of voter and civic education, the registration of voters, the nomination of candidates, the polling procedures etc. In terms of the Electoral Act, the mandate of the ECN is to organise, direct, supervise, manage and control the conduct of elections and referenda in a free, fair, independent, credible, transparent

and impartial manner as well as to strengthen constitutional democracy and to promote democratic electoral and referenda processes. Elections are indispensable to representative democracy.

2.1.3 Electoral Systems

The Namibian electoral law provides for two systems for electing representatives through democratic elections conducted at three levels, namely, national, regional and local levels. The Presidential elections are conducted every five years, and the Presidential candidate is elected for a maximum of two 5-year terms through the plurality system. A Presidential candidate requires more than 50% of the total votes to be declared duly elected. On the other hand, parliamentary candidates are elected for a 5-year term through a Proportional Representation (PR) system or a party list system.

2.1.4 Electoral Reforms

The Commission commenced with the electoral review following the conduct of 2019 PNA and 2020 Regional Councils and Local Authorities (RCLA) elections through extensive engagements with all key electoral stakeholders held between 2021 and 2023. This consultative process culminated in a Draft Electoral Amendment Bill which was submitted and considered by the Cabinet Committee on Legislation (CCL) and Cabinet in October 2023. The Bill was subsequently submitted to the Ministry of Justice for final drafting and to date this process remains incomplete. Hence

the Commission had to request the Minister of Urban and Rural Development to extrapolate section 25 of the Electoral Act for amendment to allow the Commission to start with the General Registration from June to August 2024.

2.1.4.1 Electoral amendments

Section 25 of the Electoral Act, No.5 of 2014 provides that a GRV must take place at intervals of not more than 10 years during a period determined by the President.

The previous GRV was conducted from 15 January to 02 March 2014, following an amendment to section 15 of the Electoral Act, No. 24 of 1992 in 2013. Therefore, in terms of section 25 of the current Electoral Act, the next GRV was anticipated to take place at the same period, 15 January to 02 March 2014. In the view of the Commission and based on previous experience, conducting a GRV during the same period could result in low voter registration turnout, considering factors such as possibility of rain and festive season etc.

Therefore, in terms of section 25 of the current Electoral Act, No.5 of 2014 the next GRV was anticipated to take place during a period from January to March 2024.

The ECN approached the office of the Attorney-General (AG) for an opinion on whether the law permits GRV to be conducted from April to July 2024 despite the fact that a ten-year period counted from the end of the last GRV, which took place from 15 January to 02 March 2014, would have lapsed. Based on the AG's opinion, section 25 of the Electoral Act, was subsequently amended in 2023 to provide that the 4th GRV takes place during a period not later than 31 August 2024. Consequently, GRV was conducted from 03 June to 01 August 2024. In addition, and pending the finalisation of the

amendment bill, Cabinet took a decision on 09 April 2024 to extrapolate section 77 of the Electoral Act, to provide for the remunerated members of the public service and members of the National Council, regional councils and local authority councils as contemplated in Article 47 of the Namibia Constitution to be eligible for nomination as candidates for National Assembly election; to authorise the remunerated members of the public service to utilise their leave days in order to participate and be elected as members of the National Assembly; to allow for the remunerated members of the public service who attain the age of 55 years old on or before the date on which the results of the election are announced to resign or retire for the purposes of becoming members of the National Assembly; to make provisions for the remunerated members of the public service and members of the National Council, regional councils and local authority councils who fail or refuse to resign after taking up seats at the National Assembly to be deemed to have resigned; to exclude members of the Namibian Defence Force, Namibian Police Force, Correctional Service and Intelligence Service. The amendment to section 77 was promulgated on 08 October 2024.



2.1.5 Political parties, associations/ organisations compliance

Chapter 4 of the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, provides for the establishment, registration, and deregistration of political parties and organisations, as well as the funding of political parties.

The Commission, as the exclusive body mandated to direct, supervise, manage, and control elections in a fair and impartial manner, also holds the authority to supervise, direct, and control the registration of political parties and organisations.

It is, therefore, the responsibility of the Commission to deregister political parties and organisations that violate the provisions of the Act.

Political parties and organisations are obligated to comply with specific provisions of the Electoral Act, particularly **sections 139, 140, 141, and 158**.

- **Section 139** deals with **Declaration of assets and liabilities**
- **Section 140** deals with **Records and audit of registered political parties**
- **Section 141** deals with **Disclosure of foreign and domestic financing of political parties, organisations, or other persons**
- **Section 158** deals with **political parties to account for funds**

Since the promulgation of the Electoral Act in 2014, the Commission had actively engaged with political parties to raise awareness about compliance requirements. However, most political parties and organisations failed to heed the Commission's calls for compliance.

In June 2024, the Commission took a decisive step by deregistering two political parties represented in Parliament, the Namibia Economic Freedom Fighters (NEFF) and the Christian Democratic Voice Party (CDV), due to non-compliance.

It was common cause that both parties failed to comply with the Act by not submitting the required compliance documentations outlined in the aforementioned sections.

The Commission had communicated with these parties since 2017 or so, but they remained unresponsive. Hence, the Commission took a decision to deregister them.

Following its deregistration, NEFF (the Applicant) challenged the Commission's decision in court, arguing that it had not been given an opportunity to be heard before the drastic step of deregistration was taken.

The Court reviewed the matter and found that the Commission (the Respondent) erred in deregistering NEFF without affording it a fair opportunity to present its case. Accordingly, the court set aside the decision, and NEFF was reinstated.

In its judgment, the Court also emphasized that while due process must be followed, the Commission must not be lenient toward non-compliant political parties, as doing so erodes public confidence in the electoral process. The Court stressed that all applicable provisions and sanctions must be applied rigorously to uphold the objectives of the Act.

After reviewing the judgment in the NEFF case, the Commission conducted a self-review regarding the deregistration of CDV. The same legal reasoning applied, and CDV was also reinstated to the register of political parties and organisations of the Commission.

The Commission held strongly views that it made extensive efforts to accommodate these and other political parties, first by creating awareness and second by granting sufficient time to them to comply. Nonetheless, the Court took a different view.

Upon further reflection, the Commission acknowledged that, as the exclusive body responsible for directing and managing elections and referenda, it must maintain healthy

relationships with key stakeholders, including political parties and organisations. In this light, the Commission recognises that acting as both regulator and registrar may compromise perceptions of impartiality.

The Commission, therefore, recommends that the responsibility for registration and compliance enforcement of political parties be delegated to an independent body, separate from the Commission itself.



2.2 VOTER EDUCATION & OUTREACH



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2.2 VOTER EDUCATION & OUTREACH



As a Commission we recognise that an informed voter is a strong citizen, hence, a key dimension that forms an integral part of securing meaningful voter participation and the promotion of a fully-fledged electoral democracy is Voter and Civic Education. As provided for in the Electoral Act, No.5 of 2014, as amended, Civic and Voter Education ensures the readiness, willingness and ability of voters to participate in electoral activities.

Working to increase voter registration and turnout on election day is part of the Commission's responsibility to conduct and oversee free and regular elections.

Engagement from all segments of the population is crucial for the proper execution of democratic elections. To this end, the Commission guarantees that the diverse Namibian public, along with individuals at risk of increased discrimination and marginalisation due to

disability race, socio-economic status, ethnicity, gender, or health issues, can fully exercise and enjoy their voting rights.

Voter and civic education involves a continuous discussion about the fundamental principles of democracy and the role of citizen engagement, with a wide emphasis on the Constitution, human rights, and democratic values. Civic education is an ongoing process. It also includes enhancing the conditions surrounding elections ahead of every electoral cycle to foster an environment that supports free and fair elections.

Voter education typically occurs in relation to a particular election and encompasses details such as the official date and hours; the nature of the election along with its timetable; where to register and where polling stations are located; the necessary identification and registration criteria; and the steps involved in the voting process.

2.2.1 Civic and voter education campaigns

In preparation for the 2024 electoral processes, ECN undertook a comprehensive voter and civic education campaign aimed at raising awareness about the significance of electoral participation. The campaign was designed to promote a deeper understanding of the democratic process among the citizenry, emphasising the importance of voter registration, informed voting, and active civic engagement. It particularly sought to encourage eligible Namibians to register and participate fully in the 2024 national elections, while also reinforcing a broader culture of civic responsibility.

The campaign was conducted under the overarching theme, **‘Enhancing Electoral Democracy through Electoral Processes’**, which encapsulates the Commission’s commitment to building a robust and participatory democratic system. This theme served as a guiding principle for all outreach and stakeholder engagement efforts, highlighting the need for transparency, inclusivity, and efficiency in the administration of electoral activities. It underscored the idea that democracy is strengthened not only by holding elections but by ensuring that those elections are accessible, credible, and inclusive.

To support the voter registration phase, the campaign introduced the slogan **‘Step up for your right – register to vote’**, a direct call to action encouraging all eligible citizens to take the necessary steps to secure their right to vote. This slogan was widely disseminated across multiple platforms to generate public interest and prompt proactive participation.



THE MASCOT BALLOT BOXES



For the polling phase, the campaign adopted the slogan, **‘Put your voice in the BOX’**, serving as both a motivational appeal and a reminder of the power and responsibility that comes with casting a vote. To further engage communities, fourteen (14) mascot ballot boxes were procured and used as interactive tools during educational sessions. These mascots helped to attract attention and convey messages in a relatable and visually engaging way, particularly among younger audiences. The mascots were used during community engagements, roadshows as well as trade fairs and exhibitions countrywide.



2.2.2 Voter Education Strategies

A central focus of the ECN's strategy during the 2024 electoral cycle was the enhancement of youth engagement and the adoption of innovative approaches to voter education. Recognising the critical role of young voters in shaping the future of democracy, the Commission implemented targeted interventions to improve outreach, particularly to first-time voters and individuals aged 18 to 34.

During the GRV, the Commission set a target of achieving 100% registration of eligible voters. While the final result fell slightly short of this target, a strong registration rate of 90% was recorded, indicating substantial engagement. Similarly, during the election period, the Commission aimed for 100% turnout among registered voters. Ultimately, the voter turnout reached 76.86% for the Presidential election and 76% for the National Assembly, marking an improvable, outcome. This figure represents an increase of 16.28% and 15.2% voter turnout in 2024 national elections compared to 2019 PNA elections.

2024 NPA YOUTH AMBASSADOR

A notable milestone in youth engagement was the appointment of **Miss Teen Namibia 2023, Ms Oriana Ribeiro**, as the ECN's inaugural **Lead Youth Ambassador**. Her role was to inspire and mobilise young Namibians by serving as a visible and relatable figure within the campaign. In addition, the Commission recruited **70 Youth Ambassadors**, five from each of Namibia's 14 regions to act as peer educators. These ambassadors played a crucial role in mobilising their communities, particularly by fostering a spirit of civic activism among young voters at the grassroots level.

2.2.3 Materials and Media platforms

The Commission through the Division of Voter and Civic Education developed and implemented a wide range of programmes to provide accurate and accessible information to the electorate. These programmes were deployed through both direct community engagement and mass media platforms to ensure broad coverage.

Face-to-face voter education sessions were conducted across all 121 constituencies across the country. These sessions, led by regional voter education officers, served as vital touchpoints for communities to learn about electoral processes. The voter education officers also distributed printed educational materials to individuals during these engagements. A total of 8 430 face-to-face sessions were conducted.

In addition to community-based outreach, a multi-channel media strategy was employed. The ECN collaborated with both public, private, community radios and television stations to broadcast educational content in local languages. Various radio interviews were conducted with the 11 radio stations of Namibian Broadcasting Corporation (NBC) and 21 private and community radio stations throughout the campaign process. The NBC played a significant role, partnering with the ECN to execute a nationwide radio roadshow that included all radio stations during the voter registration process. These radio drives have contributed to the increase in the registration figures during the last weeks of the GRV process. These live broadcasts included interactive segments with members of the public aimed at sensitising and promoting voter registration. In preparation of polling a similar campaign was planned and implemented engaging registered voters on the procedures at polling stations, the correct marking of ballot papers and responding to frequently asked questions by members of the public.

Outdoor advertising also featured prominently. Static and digital billboards were installed in high-traffic urban areas, while mobile advertising trailers traversed national roads, veterinary checkpoints, and rural localities to extend the campaign's reach. These mobile units were instrumental in reaching remote populations who might otherwise not have access to mainstream media. A total of 27 mobile billboard trailers depicting registration and polling dates were placed at strategic places at various roadblocks and road intersections countrywide. In addition a number of static billboards were rented to flight infographics in the following places Hosea Kutako International Airport, Windhoek Independence Avenue, Windhoek Hosea Kutako Drive, Windhoek Mandume Ndemufayo Drive (digital screen), Mariental B1 Road, Okahandja B1 Road, Gobabis B2 Road, Karibib B2 Road, Walvis Bay close to the fire station, Oshakati

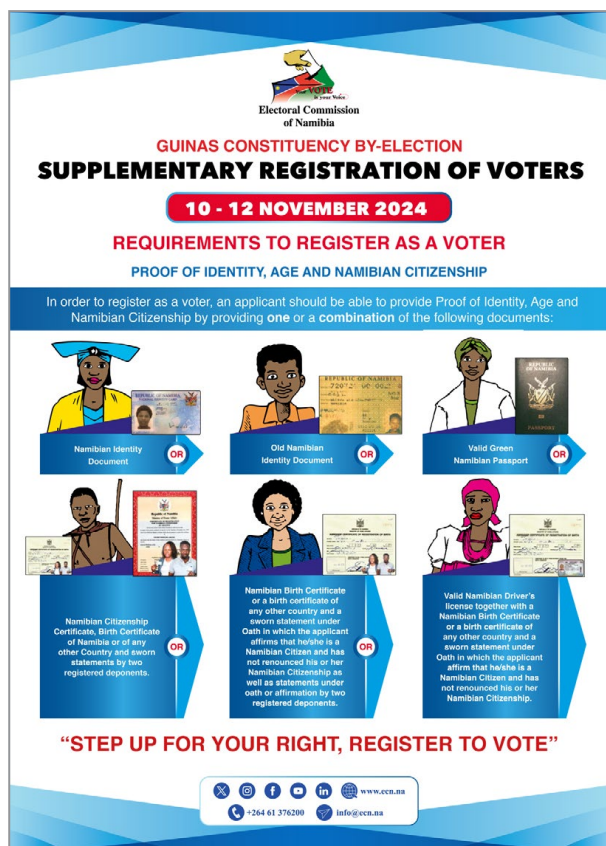
Main Road (both static and digital screen), Otjiwarongo (digital screen), Outapi, Eenhana, Omuthiya, Rundu, Divundu and Katima Mulilo.

Print media was used to disseminate detailed information through flyers, posters, and newspaper supplements. These materials addressed key topics such as the importance of voter registration, registration procedures, voting methods, and instructions for correctly marking ballot papers. The distribution of these materials was critical in ensuring that voters had the knowledge required to participate meaningfully in the elections.

A total 220 000 copies of a newspaper supplements comprising of registration points and a collection of frequently asked questions (FAQs) on the registration process was compiled and distributed through the sessions and as inserts in all the newspapers circulating in the country. For polling a similar supplement was prepared containing polling stations, voting steps in a polling station, information on the correct marking of ballot papers as well as FAQs on electoral processes. This initiative was designed to enhance public awareness and deepen stakeholders' understanding of key electoral processes.

Strategic partnerships enhanced the campaign's effectiveness. The Ministry of Information, Communication and Technology (MICT) provided human and technical resources to support regional voter education officers in order to enhance the outreach programme in preparation of the poll. Additionally, collaborations with MTC and Telecom Namibia enabled the dissemination of 1 918 558 SMS reminders during the registration period. Namibia Post Limited (NamPost) assisted with the distribution of printed materials through its 63 000 post boxes countrywide, while the Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) extended outreach efforts to faith-based communities.

2.2.4 Target Groups Reached

The ECN's voter education efforts were intentionally designed to be inclusive, targeting a wide range of community groups through structured outreach activities. These initiatives were further tailored to reach schools, government ministries, offices and agencies (OMAs), public and private sector organisations, (FBOs), and various community-based institutions.

Among the key target groups were **all eligible voters**, with outreach initiatives aimed at increasing general participation across the population. Special emphasis was placed on **young voters aged 18 to 34**, particularly **first-time voters**, to encourage early involvement and foster long-term civic responsibility.

Another critical focus was placed on **marginalised groups**, including persons with disabilities (PWDs), residents of rural and remote areas, and communities with limited access to information or electoral services. Recognising that these groups often face structural and logistical barriers to participation, the ECN made concerted efforts to adapt its outreach strategies accordingly.

The campaign also actively engaged **Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) and community leaders** who were seen as credible voices within their communities. These leaders played a pivotal role in disseminating information, encouraging participation, and helping to build trust in the electoral process.



In a concerted effort to promote **inclusiveness and accessibility**, as is a standard adopted, the ECN produced educational materials in **braille, audio, and sign language** formats. These efforts were complemented by the use of **braille and tactile ballot covers**, which ensured that visually impaired voters could cast their votes in secrecy and with dignity, enhancing the independence of their electoral participation.



2.3 STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNICATION



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2.3 STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNICATION

The Commission continuously strived to engage, maintain, strengthen and foster a trust-based and transparent relationship with all its stakeholders in a collaborative manner that promotes excellent service and creating long-term value.

In preparation of any election, the Commission collaborates with stakeholders at both local and international levels to guarantee a clear understanding of its mandate, the duties and responsibilities of the Electoral Commission, the elections in question, the Commission's preparations for these elections, and to ensure all stakeholders are aligned with the goals of the Electoral Commission. Stakeholder management occurs at a national level as well as regionally, coordinated by the Regional Electoral Officers (REOs).

2.3.1 Stakeholder engagement

Political Parties: Since the launch of the 2024 PNA Electoral Calendar on 07 March 2024, the Commission continued to engage regularly with political parties through the established Political Parties' Liaison Committee (PLC) at all material times. The contributions provided during these engagements were peaceful and constructive.

The PLC is an established platform which seeks to deliberate and consider matters pertaining to electoral processes. During the period under review, the Commission made all requisite efforts to engage PLC members at all material times by holding regular meetings to brief, share and provide an update on the execution of the Electoral Calendar. Most of the contributions made during these engagements were constructive aimed at improving and strengthening the electoral process.

Despite the diversity of opinions, PLC participation enriched the democratic process. In a special way, the Commission acknowledges and appreciates PLC for being a critical platform for engagement on matters pertaining to elections.

The Commission established, organised and offered separate engagements with various observers and the diplomatic missions as well as CSOs, NGOs, NFPDN and CCN to share information, and gather insights on electoral issues. Their presence and

involvement in the electoral process undoubtedly reinforced public trust and underscored the credibility of our electoral system. (CSOs), (NGOs), Faith-based Organisations (FBOs), the National Federation of People with Disabilities in Namibia (NFPDN) and both domestic, diplomatic and international observers are instrumental in ensuring transparency and accountability.

Law Enforcement Agencies: The Commission engaged NAMPOL on regular intervals to consult on issues of security. The maintenance of peace and order during the election period was exemplary.

The Media: As a bridge between the Commission and the public, the media played a crucial role in disseminating information, combating misinformation, and providing a platform for informed debate.

To ensure that journalists professionally discharged their reporting duties on election matters, the Commission offered training on election related topics to various media houses. In addition, the Commission arranged regular press briefings and media engagement with members of the media to share information and provide feedback on issues of national importance. The channels of engagement included press conferences, press statements, speeches, and interviews which were disseminated through the media.

2.3.2 Corporate Communication & Media Engagement

Throughout the electoral cycle, the Commission intensified communication with stakeholders ensuring timely dissemination of accurate and verified information to the public using its social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and the Media WhatsApp Group as well as newspapers, radio and TV.

In total, the Commission has released over 280 statements, speeches, public notices, infographics and adverts aimed at updating the nation, addressing issues and challenges, mis/disinformation and reporting progress on the execution of the Electoral Calendar. The Commission further engaged in robust media engagement to keep the nation up to date. These included but not limited to radio interviews on various radio stations, TV debates and interviews as well as social media posting.

2.3.3 Misinformation/disinformation

Disinformation refers to deliberate spreading false information. Like disinformation, misinformation contains false, inaccurate or incomplete information. It is spread mistakenly or unintentionally.

Some of this fake news was packaged using Artificial Intelligence (AI), which made it convincing to the recipient, when in actual fact, it was fake news. To address the mis/disinformation, the Commission issued seventeen media statements during the electoral cycle to dispel these fake narratives.

While acknowledging and appreciating some media houses for accurate reporting and support in combating mis/disinformation, the Commission wish to convey our disappointment to those media houses that deliberately fabricated fake narratives for own gain. Such acts of unprofessional journalism should be discouraged at all costs as it can spark civil unrest.

Media being a bridge between the ECN and the public, has the responsibility to ensure accurate, balanced, and timely reporting of all election-related matters. Speculation and unverified reports can lead to unnecessary confusion or disputes. We count on the media to work with the Commission in disseminating verified election results going forward.

2.4.1 Establishment of pre-determined registration and polling venues

In preparation for the conduct GRV and National elections, ECN commenced with consultation of all fourteen 14 Regional Councils during the period September 2022 to solicit inputs on the establishment of predetermined registration and polling venues to ensure unhindered access to registration and polling venues across the country.

Following regional consultations and consensus on establishment of registration and polling venues, the database of previous registration and polling stations was shared with the respective Regional Councils for inputs in November 2022. Regional Councils were granted an opportunity to provide input by the 31 March 2023 which was later extended to the 30 April 2023. Only three out

14 Regional Councils responded, and the inputs were incorporated as proposed.

Following regional consultations and consensus on establishment of registration and polling venues, the database of previous registration and polling stations was shared with the respective Regional Councils for inputs in November 2022. Regional Councils were granted an opportunity to provide inputs by the 31 March 2023 which was later extended to the 30 April 2023. While appreciating efforts made by some (three) Regional Councils in providing inputs by the set deadline which were eventually incorporated, the Commission noted with concern that some stakeholders could not provide feedback which negatively affected the planning and preparation for the 2024 national elections.

Following this exercise 4 264 local registration points served by 567 teams were established, while 35 registration points were established at all Namibian Diplomatic Missions.

During the voter registration period, the Commission noted a need, following concerns raised by some stakeholders, to establish additional registration points in some areas not adequately covered to ensure accessibility of all eligible voters. This was discussed and considered at the PLC platform. The discussions resulted in the establishment of additional 15 teams to cover 86 points in selected constituencies. The teams were established as follows:

The establishment of the additional registration teams brought the total number of teams established for the conduct of the GRV to 617 teams that covered a total number of 4 350 registration points. Most of the registration points established were secured from public institutions, such as schools and other public offices.

In preparation for the conduct of the poll, the Commission established 4 673 polling stations. Polling stations serve as critical platforms enabling registered voters to exercise their democratic rights by participating in the electoral process and electing leaders of their choice. A total number of 4 673 polling stations served by 2 526 teams were established locally to enable all registered voters to cast their votes on the 27 November 2024 across the country.

The Commission established 33 polling stations across the country to enable members of security cluster and sea-going personnel who would have been on duty on the 27 November 2024 to cast their votes under Special Voting on the 13 November 2024. All registered voters in diaspora casted their votes on the 13 November 2024 at established polling station at each of the 35 Namibian Diplomatic Missions.

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2.5 PROCUREMENT

2.5.1 Election materials and equipment

Procurement of election materials and equipment is a critical component of electoral operations to ensure the successful conduct of any election. The procurement of voter registration and election materials commenced following the consolidation of the needs assessment from all 14 the regions as outlined in the 2024 Electoral Calendar.

Timelines within which procurement of goods and services is executed is one of the critical determinants of a successful electoral process. This required a well-managed procurement process executed in compliance with the Public Procurement Act, No. 15 of 2015 as amended and the Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). Various procurement methods were used to procure voter registration and election materials as well as goods and services from various suppliers and service providers.

In line with the Electoral Operations Policy (EOP), various electoral equipment was also sourced from members of the public through expression of interest to supplement any shortages experienced.

2.5.2 Ballot Papers

Section 25 of the Electoral Act required the Commission to conduct a GRV, which entailed the total registration of all eligible voters. The Electoral Act further requires the Commission to publish a provisional voters register 90 days before the conduct of the elections of which the 90-day period expired on the 29 August 2024. The finalisation of the provisional voters register also serves as the basis for the estimation of the total number of voters eligible to vote and a key determinant of the quantum of ballot papers to be procured.

Following the conclusion of the provisional voters' register, ECN initiated the bidding process for the printing of ballot papers via an Open International Bidding method.



Taking into consideration the statutory timelines set out in the Electoral Act vis-à-vis the applicability of the Procurement Act, and its attendant timelines, it became apparent that a possible adjudication had the potential risk of compromising the delivery of the ballot papers. This implied that timelines of the Public Procurement Act have the propensity to coincide with the conduct of the elections for voting aboard, sea- going personnel and members of the security forces, which, as per the Electoral Calendar, was scheduled for 13 November 2024 and this might have jeopardized the entire electoral process.

The challenges as outlined above warranted the cancellation of the bid to mitigate the potential risk that a review process based on the inconsistency in statutory timelines and potential aggrieved bidders might have had on the timely delivery of the ballot papers and consequent conduct of the election as provided for in terms of the Electoral Act.

While the established procurement procedures are designed to ensure transparency and fairness, the aforementioned motivating factors, including the urgency of elections, security concerns, and the need for adaptability in the face of unexpected challenges warranted deviations from these protocols of which these were still applied in compliance with the provisions of the Procurement Act. Striking a balance between procedural integrity and the practical necessities of the electoral process was crucial in sustaining the public trust in democratic systems thereby acting in the best interest of the public.

Based on the above considerations, the bid was subsequently cancelled on 07 October 2024 in accordance with Section 54(1)(g) of the Public Procurement Act, and the emergency procurement method as provided for in terms of section 33(3)(b) of the Act, was applied.

After a thorough evaluation of the findings of the Procurement Management Unit and the bid documents submitted, the bid was awarded to Ren-Form CC, a South African-based printing company.

To ensure transparency in the procurement process, the Commission resolved to include political parties at all material stages to observe the printing, binding, packaging of the ballot papers. As a result, the Commission carried the costs of one member per contesting political party to participate in this process. This is part of ECN's commitment to ensure free, fair, and transparent elections.

2.6 LOGISTICS

The distribution of election materials is a highly complex and critical process, hence the logistics team demonstrated exceptional dedication, working diligently to ensure the timely allocation and delivery of all sensitive and non-sensitive materials including those for voter registration and polling to the appropriate teams as per timelines of the Electoral Calendar.

The distribution of non-sensitive voter registration and electoral materials is coordinated from the ECN Logistics Department at the Head Office to all 21 regional depots located at various Police Stations country-wide for further deployment to all constituencies. All sensitive electoral materials were equally packaged and distributed to all regions under strict security controls and deployed to pre-identified Police Stations country-wide under the escort of NAMPOL until the day of deployment. Political parties were given the opportunity to observe the entire process from the arrival of the ballot papers, distribution to deployment. Political parties were further provided with the ballot paper-distribution lists.

The distribution and dispatch of voter registration and electoral materials were carried out in coordination with our service providers—NAMPOST Courier and DHL—both domestically and internationally, under the escort of the NAMPOL, in accordance with the provisions of the Electoral Operations Policy (EOP).



2.7 TRANSPORT



Transport is a critical and integral component in ensuring the successful and effective conduct of elections. ECN maintains a fleet of 120 vehicles, the majority of which have reached the end of their economic lifespan. These vehicles are primarily utilized for voter and civic education programmes, as well as the Commission's day-to-day business and electoral operations.

In preparation for the conduct of the 2024 PNA, the Commission secured an amount of N\$25 million to supplement its aging fleet gradually into phases, to be implemented during the 2024/25 and 2025/26 financial years. During the first phase (2024/25) a total number of 34 vehicles were procured. Of these vehicles, each region was allocated two vehicles.

The ECN fleet remains insufficient to adequately support the effective execution of electoral operations (voter and civic education and election administration). In accordance with the provisions of the EOP, the Commission employs two approaches to secure the necessary transport for national electoral operations during the peak period. Firstly, through the Ministry of Works and Transport, the Commission requests support from OMAs. Alternatively, or as a contingency (Plan B), additional transport is sourced from the public in accordance with relevant provisions of the Public Procurement Act No.15 of 2015.

During both the GRV and the PNA elections, ECN was unable to secure the requested transport support from OMAs. Consequently, all vehicles deployed were successfully sourced from members of the public through expression of interest advertisement. For the GRV, a total of 1 320 vehicles were sourced and deployed, while the PNA elections necessitated the deployment of 5 350 vehicles to effectively carry out electoral operations.



2.8 RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING



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2.8 RECRUITMENT AND TRAINING

2.8.1 Recruitment

Since the 2019 National Elections, ECN has adopted a standard practice of recruiting unemployed Namibian citizens to serve as registration and election officials, in accordance with the provisions of the EOP of which the majority is the youth. This approach aligns with the ECN's commitment to empowering qualified Namibians, especially the youth, while contributing towards addressing efforts national unemployment rate.

The vacancies for election officials for both the GRV and polling were advertised in the print and social media on 28 March 2024 and closed on 28 April 2024 through the media. ECN received a total number of 82 976 applications.

Following a vigorous selection process a total of 3 005 officials were recruited for GRV and 19 784 for the conduct of the poll.

2.8.2 Training

In accordance with Section 65(2) of the Electoral Act, the Commission is mandated to ensure that all appointed officials are adequately trained and have successfully passed the numeracy, literacy, and eligibility assessments prescribed by the Commission. Comprehensive training is essential to the effective and credible conduct of all electoral processes.

For the conduct of the 2024 national elections, the Commission undertook a comprehensive review of all training manuals and introduced segregated manuals for all category of electoral officials, as follows:

- Facilitators Guide for training of election officials.
- Training Manual for Registration of Voters.
- Training manual for Police Officers and Political Party Agents.
- Training Manual for Polling Officials.
- Training Manual on Election Results Management System.

The training of election officials was conducted in phase. The first phase covered the Regional Electoral Officers (REOs), Supervisors of Registration (SoRs), and Regional IT Officers trained as trainers of trainees. This training took place from 17 to 29 March 2024 at the Out of Africa Town Lodge in Otiwarongo, in preparation for the GRV. The sessions were facilitated by responsible officials from the ECN Head Office. As part of the training process, a total number of 158 officials were trained. This approach was introduced to ensure that adequate backup reserve is maintained in response to unforeseen

circumstances. Following a comprehensive assessment process, 122 of these officials were selected to serve as SoRs and later ROs, respectively at the conclusion a performance assessment undertaken by the REO's.

Training for the staff members of the Ministry of International Relations and Cooperation (MIRCO) selected to serve as registration and polling officials at all Namibian Diplomatic Missions took place during the period 14 – 26 April 2024 at the Town Lodge in Swakopmund. Equally, this training was facilitated by ECN staff members from HQ responsible for training. This training was aimed at equipping members from MIRCO to conduct both GRV and PNA at Missions abroad. A further virtual refresher training was conducted for the same officials during the period 01 – 09 October 2024.

Training for registration officials and IT Field Support staff was cascaded to constituency clusters, coordinated and facilitated by SoRs with the support from REOs. This training was conducted across all 14 regions from 22 – 31 May 2024, in preparation for the GRV.

In preparation for the conduct of the poll, training for ROs and Regional IT Support Staff was held at The Dome in Swakopmund from 02 – 12 September 2024. This was followed by cascaded training sessions for polling officials and IT Field Support staff, conducted at constituency clusters. The training coordinated by REOs, ROs, and Regional IT teams from 15 to 24 November 2024. In addition, training on the Election Results Management System (ERMS) took place at NIPAM, Windhoek for the Returning Officers and Constituency Collation Support Staff during the period 06 November 2024.

At all stages, following the conclusion of the training, all categories of election officials were subjected to a vigorous assessment process as provided for in terms of the Electoral Act, and assigned roles based on their performance. The Commission established a pass rate of 60% and above across all levels of election officials.

2.8.3 Training for youth ambassadors

The training for youth ambassadors was conducted from 15 – 21 September 2024 to prepare and equip this category of officials with the necessary skills and knowledge to conduct and support ECN voter education officials to effectively execute the voter and education strategy.

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2.9 GENERAL REGISTRATION OF VOTERS

In accordance with Section 25 of the Electoral Act, as amended, ECN is mandated to conduct a GRV every ten years. The GRV entails the total registration of all eligible voters, irrespective of whether they were previously registered discarding the existing voters register and creating a new national and local authorities' voters register.

The GRV took place over a period of 52 days from 03 June – 01 August 2024. The outcome of the 2024 GRV is detailed under 2.9.2 below.



2.9.1 Production and display of Provisional Voters Register

On the 02 August 2024, the Commission announced the successful conclusion of the 4th National GRV. The Commission was pleased to note that during the *last four days* of the registration period, from the 29 July - 01 August 2024, a total of **152,472** eligible voters were registered. This figure represented an average of **38,002** registered voters per day during the week of **29 July – 01 August 2024**, which was the highest turnout recorded weekly since the commencement of GRV. This brings the overall cumulative number of eligible Namibians registered as voters, both within the country and at Namibian Diplomatic Missions, to **1,467,604** representing a turnout of **91%** of eligible voters for the GRV.

Following the completion of the GRV, and in line with the provisions of the Electoral Act and established integrity protocols, the Provisional Voters' Register (PVR) was produced, published, and displayed for public inspection in all 121 constituencies at designated venues from 29 August – 04 September 2024 in accordance with the provisions of the Electoral Act with no objections received. This process enabled registered voters and political parties to scrutinize the register and submit objections to the inclusion of any ineligible individuals through the designated Electoral Tribunals. All registered political parties were provided with soft copies of the PVR on the 29 August 2024 in compliance with the Electoral Act.

The *cumulative provisional number of registered voters per region* is displayed in **the Table below**.

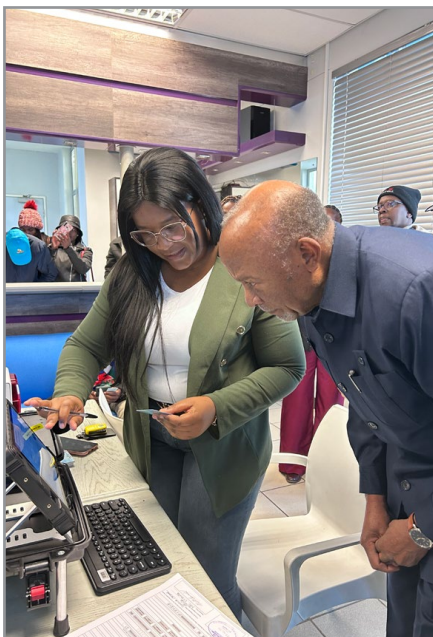

At the conclusion of the GRV, the Commission extended its deepest gratitude to all registered voters and electoral stakeholders who have demonstrated unwavering support towards ensuring effective voter education campaigns since the commencement of the GRV until its logical conclusion. The Commission acknowledged with appreciation the collective support from electoral stakeholders at all levels that significantly contributed to the successful conduct of the GRV. The collective efforts of our stakeholders in supporting and enhancing the Commission's communication drive and strategy to have eligible voters registered, were invaluable.

The conclusion of the display and inspection period for the PVR marked a foundation for the finalisation of the final stage of running Automated Fingerprint Information System (AFIS) to ensure integrity of the registration data that culminated in the production and release of the Final Voters Registers (FVR).







2.9.2 Final Voters' Register

The final voters' register was published on 30 September 2024 as provided for in terms of Section 36 (4) and displayed at constituency offices in all 121 constituencies.

Running the Automatic Fingerprint identification System (AFIS) is a continuous process and executed as part of the security features incorporated in the voter registration system in preparation for the production and maintenance of a Final Voters Register (FVR) for any election. In preparation for the finalisation and production of the 2024 Voters Registers, the Commission, *through verification of the provisional voter registration data released on 29 August 2024*, was able to detect 1 875 (0.13%) multiple entries as part of the integral security measures of running AFIS at different stages in addition to 13 685 double entries detected during the release of provisional voters register. These were voters who tried to register more than once using different types of identification documents which the system was capable of detecting. Following verification of the data, the FVR was produced with 1 449,569 registered voters representing 90% of the eligible voters with final statistics as represented in the table below.

2.10 OPERATIONAL IMPLICATIONS OF CONDUCTING GRV AND SRV IN ONE YEAR

2.10.1 Introduction

- 2.10.1.1 Following a thorough analysis and interpretation of the legal opinion sought and received (*Letter dated 2 August 2023*) from the Office of the Attorney-General, the ECN requested for the amendment to Section 25 of the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014 for the General Registration of Voters (GRV) to be shifted from January – March 2024 to a period not less than April 2024 and not more than August 2024; consistent with the legal opinion provided.

2.10.2 Implications associated with conducting both GRV and Supplementary Registration of Voters (SRV) in one year (2024)

- 2.10.2.1 Although the purpose of an SRV is to register those voters who have turned 18 years after the last GRV or have changed addresses, holding the GRV closer to the election-date still caters for all categories of voters. To determine a need for an SRV, it would require engagement with the Ministry of Home Affairs, Immigration, Safety and Security to determine from the National Population Register how many potential voters would be turning 18 years following the conduct of the GRV. However, executing an SRV after GRV was projected to be a grave challenge taking into account the following prescribed critical activities of a registration process including:
- a) 90 days of finalising the Provisional Voters Register (PVR) before voting day;
 - b) Prescribed period for displaying PVR for objections;
 - c) Prescribed period for ruling by magistrates;
 - d) Finalisation of final the Voters' Register to pave the way for the nomination process which is also a prescribed process and determining the required quantity of ballot papers; and
 - e) Process of procurement and printing of ballot papers, amongst others.
- 2.10.2.2 Conducting either a GRV only or an SRV after the GRV, legally and as per international standards required a cut-off date for the finalisation of the Voters' Register [i.e., Provisional Voters' Register (*90 days before voting day*) and Final Voters' Register] was imperative as this was the key determinant for planning for the election at hand.
- 2.10.2.3 In the case of a change of address, the voter would not be disenfranchised, as for the purpose of the Presidential and National Assembly Elections, a voter could vote at any polling station within or outside the constituency he/she is resident.
- 2.10.2.4 The conduct of GRV during **January – March 2024** would imply finalising all activities between **05 – 12 May 2024** and basically provide less than **58 days** to prepare for the conduct of the SRV immediately after the GRV, the application of this option would not be cost effective. Furthermore, during those 58 days, the preparation for the conduct of the SRV would need to be finalised such as clearing all IMVRS with data of GRV, preparation

of the devices for deployment, preparation and training of registration officials which is mandatory in terms of the Electoral Act and hence made the timelines very limited.

- 2.10.2.5 Due to the limited timelines and prescribed days (90 days) to finalise the Provisional Voters' Register in compliance with relevant provisions of the Electoral Act, it would be practically impossible to conduct SRV after GRV even if it was scheduled to be conducted, *for instance*, over a period of 14 days only.
- 2.10.2.6 In spite of challenges in respect of prescribed days (90 days) to finalise the Provisional Voters' Register, conducting both GRV and SRV in the same year (2024) implied complex registration processes which are associated with very huge financial implications to deploy the required number of registration officials and vehicles over a period determined for each registration process (i.e., GRV and SRV) as outlined below (*excluding costs relating to voter and civic education activities*).

2.10.3 Justification for conducting only GRV during 2024 and prescribed key activities executed post GRV before Voting Day in forfeit of SRV.

- 2.10.3.1 Administratively, the Commission anticipated that it would be more practical and economical to conduct GRV during the period (i.e. **2 June – 1 August 2024**) within which SRV would have been conducted thereby still allowing all eligible voters to register anew making the process still consistent with the application of the relevant provisions of the Electoral Act. This option would enable the ECN to avoid unnecessary costs and potential risks of not finalising the Provisional Voters Register due to very limited timelines between the two processes (GRV and SRV) as indicated above.
- 2.10.3.2 Preparation and finalisation of the Provisional Voters' Register for readiness before the **26 August 2024** which was the prescribed cut-off date for 90 days, required uploading of voter registration data, running of Automated Finger Integrated System (AFIS) for adjudication and production and printing of Provisional Voters Register for display in all 121 constituencies which needed to be finalised within 21 days.
- 2.10.3.3 In compliance with the provisions of the Electoral Act, the following prescribed activities took place post-GRV:
- Uploading of the new voters' data to the central server, AFIS matching and adjudication, **05 – 15 August 2024**
 - Production and dispatch of Provisional Voters' Register for display in 121 constituencies, **16 – 24 August 2024**

- c) Publication in the Gazette availability of Provisional Voters' Register – Section 31 (1) (b) (ii) (90 days), **26 August 2024**
- d) Display of the Provisional Voters' Register for objections during **26th August 2024 – 02nd September 2024** for a period of eight (8) days determined by the Commission in terms of the Electoral Act.
- e) Representations for objections before the Magistrates and ruling **27th August – 10th September 2024** for a period of 15 days (Section 32 (3)(b)(ii)) .
- f) Hearing of appeals against objections and ruling from **11 – 18 September 2024** within a period of 7 days (Section 33 (1)).
- g) Publication of the Final Voters' Register not later than the **30th September 2024**.
- h) Nomination process from **26th September 2024 -16th October 2024** for a period not less than 15 days and not more than 20 days (Section 64 (3)(a)). With the **14th October 2024** being the final day for Independent Candidates and the **16th October 2024** final day for political parties and public sitting by the Chairperson.
- i) Verification of nomination list of candidates and parties with the assistance of the Ministry of Finance and Public Enterprises/NamRA to ensure compliance with Section 77 4 (a) and Article 46 (1) (a) of the Namibian Constitution before last day of the public sitting and final announcement of nominations running concurrently with the nomination process from 26 September - **13 October 2024**.
- j) Preparation of the nomination list and production of ballot paper templates to be carried out concurrently from **17 – 20 October 2024**.
- k) Production and printing of ballot papers including proofreading and verification by Political Parties/Candidates and approval by the Commission will take place from **21 – 23 October 2024**.
- l) Oversee printing of Ballot Papers **24 – 29 October 2024**.
- m) Delivery of ballot papers from **30 October – 02 November 2024**.
- n) Packing and distribution of ballot papers for voting aboard at all Namibia Diplomatic Missions between the **03 – 07 November 2024**.
- o) Voting aboard on the **12 November 2024** (Section 64 (2)(a-c)).
- p) Packing and distribution of ballot papers in country voting concurrently with packing ballot papers for voting abroad between **03 – 17 November 2024**.
- q) Voting locally on **26 November 2024** (Section 64 (3) (b) 41 days).

2.10.4 Alternation of boundaries or constituencies during or after the GRV process

The voter registration system functionality and the software development of the integrated mobile voter registration management system utilised geospatial mapping systems which made it possible to only move a voter from one constituency/region to another and any change on the voter registration system required authentication of the voter by way of fingerprint scanning.

Furthermore, updating the Voters' Register by means of only transferring voters to the constituency/region so changed as a result of the demarcation, further required the voter registration management system to be upgraded with geospatial mapping systems used by surveyors as the current system was not linked to constituency boundaries or maps, in order to effectively determine those affected if any change to constituency/regional boundaries were to be effected.

In the absence of such systems, which would also require time and resources the only option left would have been to conduct an SRV in the constituencies or regions affected after demarcation.

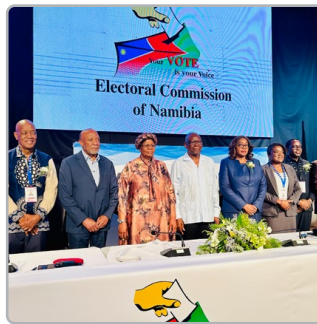
2.10.5 Conclusions

2.10.5.1 It was concluded that:

- a) Instead of conducting the GRV over a period of 42 days, it was proposed that the period be extended to a period of 52 days to eliminate any concerns of not providing sufficient time for persons to register and ensure a wide coverage as advised by the AG.
- b) Conducting GRV only would also be more economical as conducting SRV basically within a period of less than 58 days after a GRV was not only uneconomical but also impractical.
- c) Conducting GRV only would not only be economically feasible but would also allow more time for execution of critical activities that include, *amongst others*, uploading of data, AFIS adjudication, in order to ensure the credibility of the Voters' Register.



CHAPTER 3



ELECTION PHASE

This chapter provides a review of the electoral activities undertaken during the election phase in preparation for the conduct of polls for the 2024 PNA elections. Election phase is defined as the period leading to the polling day. The chapter gives a brief synopsis of the accreditation of election observers and media, process of nomination of candidates, special voting, voting (election) day, counting, collation and announcement of election results, electoral technologies and risk management. Electoral systems and electoral reform undertaken giving the legal scope under which PNA elections were held. Furthermore, the chapter also gives highlights on ECN's state of readiness for the conduct of 2024 PNA elections with specific focus on giving update to all key electoral stakeholders form local and international arena.



3.1 ELECTION OBSERVATION



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3.1 ELECTION OBSERVATION AND MEDIA



3.1.1 Pre-Election Assessment Observer Missions (PEAOMs)

The Commission received 4 pre-election observer missions to assess ECN's state of preparedness for the 2024 PNA and to ensure adherence to international standards of fairness, transparency and inclusivity.

The Commission received Preliminary Statements from the Electoral Commissions Forum (ECF-SADC), Africa Centre for Governance (ACG) and the SADC Electoral Advisory Council (SEAC) with the following summarized finding/observations, and recommendations.

Overall, the government of the Republic of Namibia and all electoral stakeholders were commended for subjecting themselves to the scrutiny, which demonstrated their openness to democratic and good governance values.



3.1.2 Media Accreditation

To ensure access to polling stations, reporters/journalists were provided with access identification cards prior to polling day. The accreditation process was done with the assistance and requirements of the Ministry of Information and Communication Technology (MICT). A total number 1 856 individuals were accredited to cover elections, these were from 16 local media houses, three international media houses and three freelance journalists.

Among them were; Confidante Newspaper, Media Ombudsman, Eagle FM, Future Media, Informante Newspaper, Kosmos Radio Namibia, (Hitradio Namibia), Namib Times Newspaper, the NBC, Namibia Daily News, Namibia Press Agency (NAMP), Network Media Hub (NMH), New Era Publication, The Namibian, The Notebook – WTE, Windhoek Observer, Xinhua News Agency, SABC News, Agence France Presse (AFP) and Turkish Radio and Television.

The purpose was to allow media personnel unhindered access to all polling stations. In addition, the Commission provided space in the Central Elections Results Centre (CERC) for all accredited media houses. The access cards issued to the media included a QR code containing important information such as polling venues, Regional Electoral Officers contact details, returning officers, emergency numbers, voter and civic education information materials, electoral calendar etc. The Commission is pleased to note that it did not receive reports of media harassment except complaints of favouring the national broadcaster, NBC at one instance where the Commission had addressed the nation through NBC TV.

3.1.3 Accreditation of Observers

Accrediting election observers is a vital component of an electoral system as it ensures transparency, accountability, and fairness throughout the electoral process. Section 56 of the Electoral Act No. 5 of 2014, as amended, outlines the criteria used by the Commission to qualify individuals and organisations as election observers. The Commission equally applied this criterion to accredit both local and international observers and media.

The Commission through the then Ministry of International Relations and Cooperation (MIRCO) extended invitations to African Union, SADC, European Union, Commonwealth and other international and regional organisations to observe the 2024 PNA elections. Furthermore, a call for application to all other interested organisations was extended on 19 August 2024 and closed on 30 October 2024. The invitation with detailed requirements was placed on the ECN website and social media platforms.

3.1.4 Number of accredited observers, media and diplomatic missions

A total of 4 local and 10 international observer missions, 2 Electoral Management Bodies (EMBs), and 3 individuals totalling 483 individuals were accredited to observe elections. Furthermore, 19 diplomatic missions domiciled in Namibia were accredited.

3.1.5 Observers' Briefing

The Commission met all accredited Observers on 22 November 2024 at Mercure Hotel, Windhoek. The purpose of the meeting was to brief the observers on the state of preparedness for the 27 November polls emphasising and offering full commitment and cooperation with observer missions and the media.

During the engagement, the Commission highlighted key milestones whilst acknowledging challenges.

In conclusion, observer missions were unanimous in their acknowledgement of the peaceful way the elections were conducted on the whole notwithstanding the technical and operational glitches, most of the observer missions declared the 2024 Presidential and National Assembly elections free, fair and credible. Overall, they expressed that they were *adequately briefed* and, in most instances, had unhindered access to polling stations. Most missions did not manage to observe the counting part of the election process as voting was extended beyond their deployment days.

The ECN endeavours to consider the observations and recommendations of the various observation missions as contained in their reports with the view to improve electoral processes.

3.2 NOMINATION OF CANDIDATES

The process of nomination of candidates commenced on 26 September 2024 and was initially scheduled to conclude on 16 October 2024 with a public sitting. The public sitting was extended to 17 October 2024 at 11:00 in terms of Section 75(3) (b) of the Electoral Act to provide time to three (3) independent presidential candidates to rectify anomalies on their nomination.

After careful consideration of the nomination documents lodged with the Commission, at the conclusion of the nomination process on the 17 October 2024, the Commission in terms of section 75(3) of the Electoral Act (Act 5 of 2014), rejected the nominations of **Ms Ally S.I. Angula**, **Ms Else Ndapandula Chen** and **Mr Jeremia Kaambo** as independent candidates for the Presidential Election scheduled for 27 November 2024. At the official close of the submission process on **17 October 2024 at 11h00**, these issues remained unattended in compliance with the aforementioned legal provision.

The grounds of the rejection were as follows:

- a) In respect of **Ms Ally S.I. Angula**, her nomination did not meet the requirements of section 72(c)(ii) of the Electoral Act, in that it was not supported by at least 500 registered voters per region. The signatures of some of the registered supporters did not correspond with signatures of the listed supporters on the voters' register. The confirmed registered supporters were 5 653. The candidate was therefore short of 1 347 in respect of eight regions as only six out of 14 regions had the complete number of the requisite signatures.
- b) In respect of **Ms Else Ndapandula Chen**, her nomination did not meet the requirements of section 72(c)(ii) of the Electoral Act, in that it was not supported by at least 500 registered voters per region. Submissions were lodged in respect of 12 out of (14) regions of Namibia. Not one region had the complete number of the requisite 500 signatures. The Commission further noted and observed that the supporters' consent was not obtained as certain **declarations are indicated as 'Not Applicable' where the signature is supposed to be affixed on the said declaration. The supporter's consent was thus not obtained in compliance with the Act.** Following the Commission's consideration, the candidate did not respond to any communication from the Commission seeking clarity on the issues of raised.
- c) In respect of **Mr Jeremia Kaambo**, his nomination did not meet the requirements of section 72(c)(ii) of the Electoral Act, in that it was not supported by at least 500 registered voters per region; the signature on Form 17, Part D, where the candidate consented to the nomination as a candidate in the Presidential election, did not correspond with the signature on his application for registration as a voter. Following the Commission's consideration, the candidate expressed his dissatisfaction with the process via email.

Declaration of candidates for Presidential Election:

On 17 October 2024 at 11:00, the Chairperson of the Commission declared the following fifteen (15) nominations from registered political parties to have been duly considered and found to comply with the requirements of Section 73 of the Electoral Act:

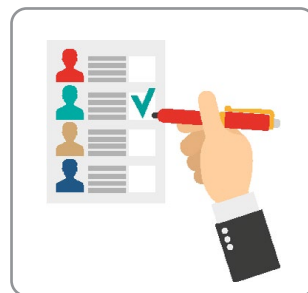
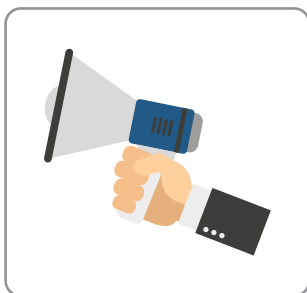

3.3 CAMPAIGN PROCESS AND SIGNING CODE OF CONDUCT



Following the successful conclusion of nomination process, political parties and candidates proceeded with their election campaigns, actively promoting their manifestos to garner public support and secure election to public office.

The Commission commended all political parties and their followers for holding a generally peaceful campaign. This period showed that our democracy is growing and maturing. The Commission also commended the supporters of all the political parties for exercising restraint and maturity and more importantly for adhering to the Code of Conduct for political parties and organisations which was launched and signed by all contesting political parties on 08 November 2024.

In accordance with regulation 7 of the Code of Conduct, the official campaign period concluded 24 hours before polling day.

3.4.1 Special voting



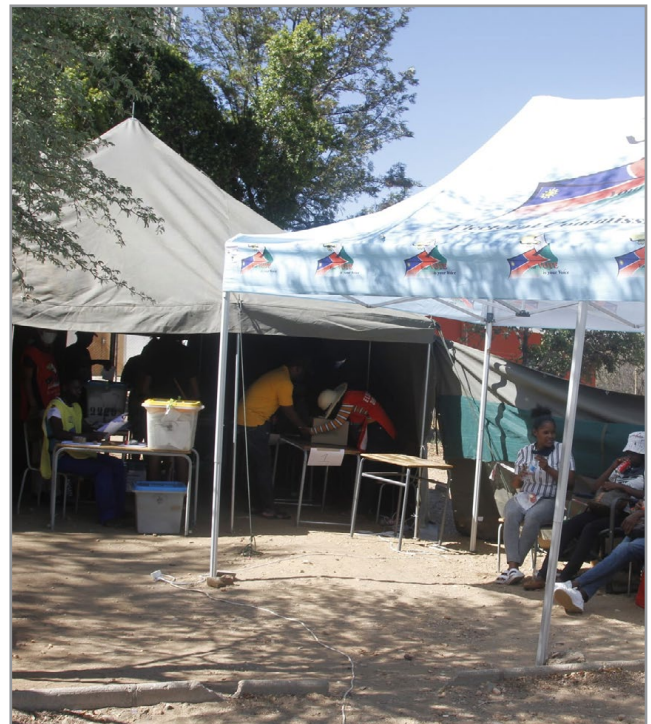
In preparation for special voting, the Commission wrote to the security cluster and fishing industry through the Security Commission and Ministry of Fisheries and Marine Resources (MFMR) to provide a total number of anticipated voters expected to cast their votes on special voting day. This was to ensure smooth allocation of resources. However, the information was partially or not provided to the Commission.

As a result, during the special voting, there were reports of ballot paper shortages particularly in Khomas, Erongo, and Otjozondjupa regions, due to the number of persons who turned up against the number of ballot papers allocated. Both security clusters and the fishing industry did not provide an accurate estimated numbers of the personnel who were expected to vote during special voting day. To mitigate the challenging situation, the Commission effected requisite arrangements to transfer additional ballot papers from logistic stores to the affected constituencies to continue the voting process.

3.4.1.1 Time polling stations opened

Polling kicked off on a good note. At 07:00am majority of polling stations across the country opened, with the exception of a few that delayed because of slight challenges such as finalising polling set-up and administration of commissioning of oath for political party agents as well as the withdrawal of vehicles by private owners in some constituencies. However, this situation was resolved and all teams proceeded with the voting process.





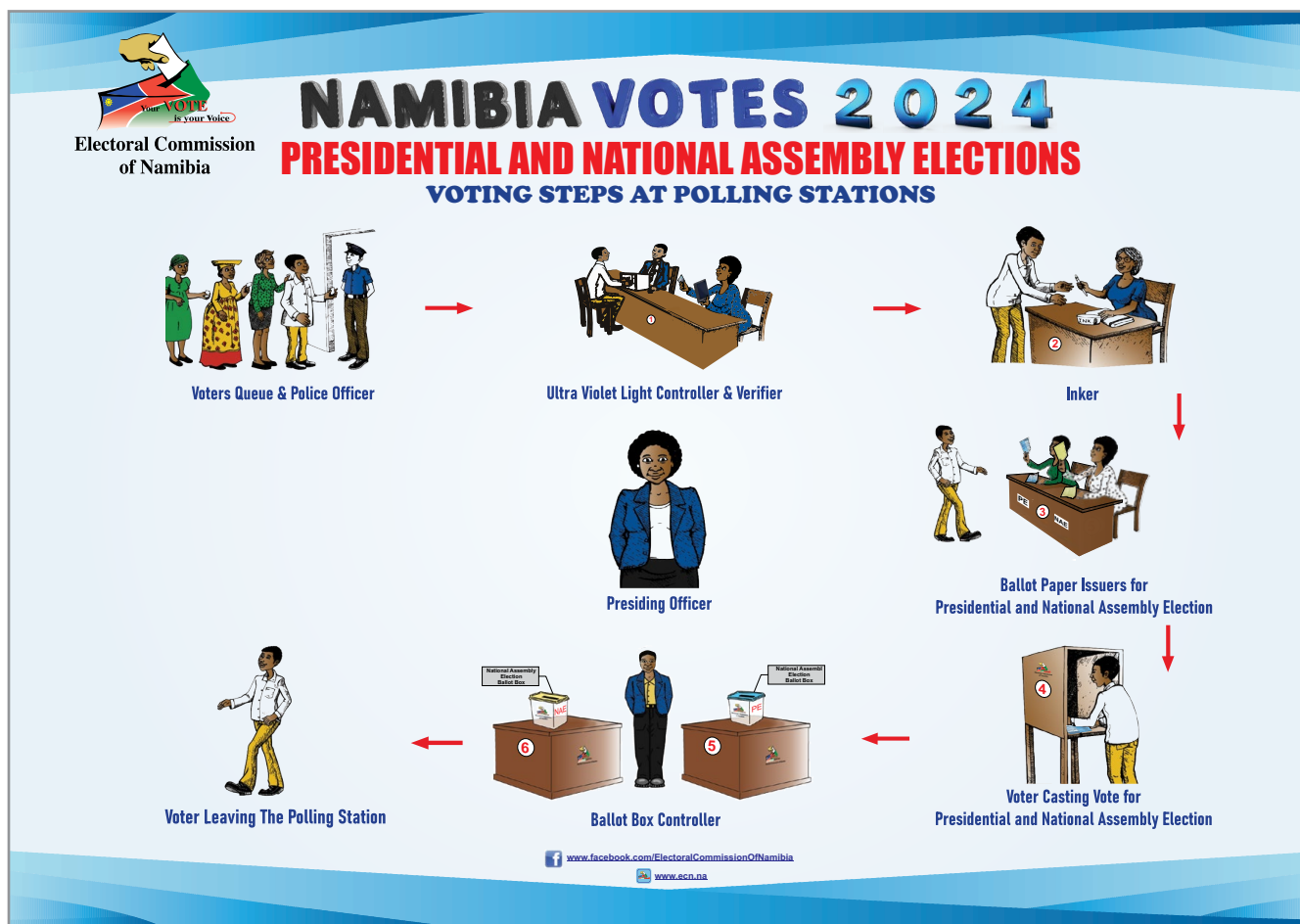
3.4.1.2 Availability of materials

All sensitive and non-sensitive materials for polling were available at all polling stations despite reports of shortage of ballot papers experienced at some polling stations mostly attributed to legal provisions made to vote anywhere during PNA elections.

Although the ballot papers were allocated per total number of registered voters in a constituency with an additional 15% to cater for spoiled ballot papers and voters turning up in constituencies where they were not registered, the allocations to teams were insufficient. Electoral operating procedures allow for polling stations to transfer ballot papers from other stations in instances of any shortages. This process follows administrative and logistical protocols to ensure accountability and transparency for every ballot paper transferred.

Despite the reports of alarming shortages of ballot papers at some polling stations, the Commission observed a number of unused ballot paper books which were accounted for at the completion of the polls.

Furthermore, the Commission noted that in some polling stations, the batteries for the ultraviolet light torches, used for verification of voters drained faster than anticipated. To avert this, extra batteries were supplied to the polling stations so that polling could proceed uninterrupted.



3.4.1.3 Use of voter verification devices

During the voting process, ECN used tablets which were loaded with the National Voter Register to authenticate each voter's identity before issuance of ballot papers. The voter verification devices proved to be effective and efficient if compared to manual verification and the old hand-held devices used in past elections. However, isolated incidents of tablets heating up were reported at polling stations which experienced a high influx of voters and where tents were setup as polling stations. Despite polling being occasionally interrupted at some polling stations due to this challenge, presiding officers opted to use Elect 27 forms as permissible by law to allow the voting process to continue while rebooting the tablets.

3.4.1.4 Accessibility and inclusivity

Most of the polling stations established were accessible to all category of voters, including PWD's. Voters did not travel long distances to access established polling stations. In rural areas where voters are usually scattered, mobile teams were established to visit these polling stations to ensure that every voter exercised his or her democratic right.

The Commission observed and noted reports regarding slow movement of the queues. Long queues observed during elections especially in urban areas, were mainly attributed to the legal provision that permits voters to vote anywhere in the country during PNA as well as operational inefficiencies of polling staff such as the use of one polling booth despite the directive to setup more than one polling booth.

Furthermore, the Commission observed that some mobile polling stations could not operate because when the teams arrived at these polling stations voters had reportedly left. This was mainly because mobile teams had to spend extra time serving all voters who were in the queue on time leading to prolonged waiting at the next mobile polling stations. Most of these challenges emanated from the legal provisions made for anyone to vote from anywhere during PNA elections.

3.4.1.5 Occurrence book

The Commission placed an Occurrence Book (OB) for the recording of any incidents or complaints in all polling stations. The purpose of an OB is to enable any aggrieved person or party to record such incidence or complaint as provided for in terms of the Electoral Act. Following the conduct of an election, an OB serves as proof of an incident or complaint and may used as evidence to this effect. The Commission is pleased to note that no major incidences recorded in the OBs. Furthermore, isolated incidences recorded were addressed swiftly at polling stations and counting venues.

3.4.1.6 Poll Closing

Polling stations closed at 21h00. At the close of the poll, all voters who were in the queue at 21h00 were allowed to cast their votes. However, due to the depletion of ballot papers at some polling stations, the Commission issued a directive instructing REOs to ensure that polling stations with a surplus of ballot papers were not closed at 21h00 to allow transfer of the unused ballot papers to polling stations where shortages were experienced.

A total of 247 polling stations reported to have experienced shortages of ballot papers. Out of the 247 polling stations, 218 managed to transfer ballot books while 29 polling stations either ran out of ballot papers or mobile teams could not reach the next polling point on time.

In order to ensure that voters at the affected 29 polling stations were not disenfranchised, the Commission consulted the Office of the Attorney General and subsequently recommended the extension of voting at the polling stations concerned with two days.

Procedures followed

In terms of Section 104 of the Electoral Act, the Presiding Officer at a polling station must immediately after the close of the poll of an election and in the presence of persons entitled in terms of Section 94 (1) to attend at the polling station take charge of all ballot boxes and ensure that such ballot boxes are sealed accordingly.

Vote Counting

The counting of the results was done in terms of Section 105 of the Act after the close of the poll and in the presence of counting agents and observers. The results were announced, posted at all polling stations, uploaded and transmitted to a collation centre established in each constituency. Political party agents were entitled to recount the outcome of the poll at the polling station before results were moved to the collation centre where all results from all polling stations were collated and further transmitted to the national level for consolidation and final announcement by the Chairperson of the Commission in compliance with section 109 of the Electoral Act.

3.4.1.7 Results management

The results from various collation centres across the 121 constituencies were transmitted to CERC and timely released as soon as they were verified, consolidated, and certified. On 3 December 2024, the Chairperson of the Commission by virtue of Section 109 and 110, officially announced and declared the Presidential and National Assembly Election results.

3.4.1.8 Central Election Results Management Centre

As a requirement, a Central Election Results Management Centre (CERC) was established as a central election management centre where constituency results from collation centres were certified, consolidated and aggregated to national level results.

The Commission extended an invitation to all contesting political parties to be oriented on the Election Results Management System (ERMS) and subsequently initiated on the operations of the CERC and election result system for purpose of transparency. In addition, the Commission provided 2 access cards to every contesting political party to access the CERC as part of Commission's commitment to maintain involvement of political parties and ensure transparency at all material stages. Besides the Commission extending the invitation to all political parties, a very low turnout was observed.

3.4.1.9 Announcement and declaration of results

On 03 December 2024, the Chairperson of the Commission in terms of section 109 (1) the Electoral Act, announced the total number of votes counted in respect of each Presidential candidate and in accordance with section 109 subsection (2) also declared the candidate who has accumulated the highest votes duly elected as President with effect from such dates determined by the Namibian Constitution. The results were announced and declared as follows:

3.4.1.9.1 Presidential election

15 candidates contested the presidential election. A total of 14 552 votes were rejected, representing 1.3% of the total votes cast.

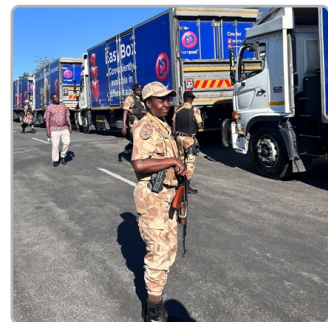
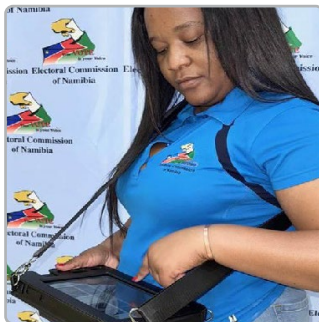

4.1 TECHNOLOGY AND SYSTEMS



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4.1 TECHNOLOGY AND SYSTEMS

4.1.1 Enhancement of the election management systems

Over the past decade, new technologies have been playing an integral role in the organisation of an increasing number of elections around the world. A number of countries, including Namibia have turned to a variety of technological solutions in a bid to make elections more efficient and cost effective, and to strengthen stakeholder trust in each stage of the electoral cycle. In particular, biometric technology now plays a significant role in a number of electoral processes, such as voter registration and the identification of prospective voters at the polling station on Election Day. Technology is also playing an increased role in enhancing the integrity of electoral processes and strengthening trust between stakeholders.

Given a review of the electoral systems introduced since 2010 and subsequent review of the election management systems after the conduct 2019 and 2020 national elections, the Commission initiated the enhancement of the customised Integrated Mobile Voter Registration System (IMVRS) election management solution. These enhancements focused on existing systems, namely voter registration, voter verification and results managements, while also introducing new solutions, focusing on registration of political parties/associations, nominations of candidates or political parties for all elections (i.e. national elections and by-elections).

The introduction of the IMVRS, commenced with mock-registrations in two phases conducted in various constituencies country-wide during the period 15 – 17 November 2023 and 15-16 February 2024. The purpose of this exercises was to stress test the efficiencies of the system and identify any shortcomings to address these before the actual roll-out of the system. During both mock registration exercises, minor glitches and shortcomings were detected, which were effectively addressed before the implementation of the system.

In view of this, the Commission engaged and invited political parties/associations/organizations to partake and observe the mock-registration exercises during which the voter registration module November 2023 and January 2024 in various constituencies country-wide. This was to ensure involvement of our stakeholders at all materials stages of the newly enhanced technological solutions thereby increasing the level of transparency and credibility of the electoral process.

The Integrated Mobile Voter Registration System leverages on technology to make voter registration more responsive and efficient, marking a significant milestone in our efforts to modernise and improve our electoral processes. The system incorporates advanced security and verification measures to ensure the integrity of the electoral processes.

In preparation for GRV, the ICT division prepared a total of 1244 IMVRS kits, 140 tablets and 1244 printers (including 622 spare printers) used for voter registration nationwide, with support from our service providers. These processes involved initial preparation of the tablets, testing of IMVRS devices, technical training of end-users and data uploading to the ECN central database.

The enhanced IMVRS significantly enhanced the efficient execution of the GRV, and preparation of the national voters register.

During the period of 26 September to 16 October 2024, both registered political parties and independent candidates were required to submit their nominations. For the first time political parties were able to submit their nominations through the newly introduced online Political Party Candidate Management Portal (PPCM) <https://ppcm.ecn.na> from anywhere.

The Political Party and Candidate Management (PPCM) system consists of the back-end component, which is strictly managed by ECN technical team. All nominations were successfully conducted using the PPCM application. One of the key benefits of the PPCM is that it instantly verifies candidates' requirements and hence enables political parties/candidates to rectify any anomalies.

A total of 136 and 4 030 verification tablets were prepared for special voting and the national elections respectively. The voter verification tablets were used to verify voters at polling stations and to upload results from polling stations to collation centres.

4.1.2 Technical issues and troubleshooting

While the Commission observed notable benefits of the enhanced technological solutions during the implementation a few minor technical challenges were also noted such as:

- a) Heating up of tablets at midday, due to prolonged voter verification and registration especially for teams operating under venues with poor ventilation especially when the environment experienced high temperatures.
- b) Human error from operators was attributed to lack of competency and confidence to operate the kits.

To mitigate these challenges the Commission commenced engagements with the relevant service providers to identify workable solutions in preparation of future elections.

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4.2 SECURITY AND RISK MANAGEMENT

4.2.1 Public awareness on curbing violence

In preparation for the 2024 PNA, the Namibian Police deployed 5 042 Officers across the country. The deployment was aimed at ensuring safety and security during the election process. The Namibian Police further intensified patrols to ensure the safety of voters.

The Namibian Police in collaboration with the Commission issued a joint statement outlining the precautionary and public awareness measures aimed at curbing violent situations requiring members of the public to abide during electoral process. The following precautionary measures were set and shared with members of the public to abide to:

- a) Refrain from carrying firearms or dangerous weapons and exercise patience and always cooperate with election officials and security personnel.
- b) Owners of liquor outlets were reminded that selling of alcohol was prohibited and implored to play their part in ensuring peaceful election processes by closing their shops on Wednesday, 27 November 2024 as it was declared a public holiday.
- c) No vendors were allowed to operate around the polling stations.
- d) Political parties were prohibited from campaigning on polling day.
- e) No political activities were allowed to occur within a radius of 50 metres of a polling station.
- f) Voters were requested to not clothe themselves in political party regalia at or near polling stations as this had a potential to compromise secrecy of the vote. Voters found attending to the polling stations in party colours were requested to return dressed appropriately before being permitted to cast their vote.
- g) No party branded vehicles were allowed within a radius of 500 metres of the polling station

4.2.2 Isolated incidents reported

The Commission noted with appreciation that the 2024 national elections were once again conducted in a peaceful and secure manner. No incidents of security breaches and violence were reported during the electoral processes. However, reports of isolated cases of inappropriate conduct of some security personnel and election officials threats to strike on election day were recorded and swiftly managed.

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5.1 SUMMARY OF ELECTORAL COURT CHALLENGES

5.1.1 In the matter RDP and Four Others v ECN and Five Others

In the matter RDP and Four Others v ECN and Five Others, in the Windhoek Electoral Tribunal, heard on 21 August 2024, and judgment delivered on 28 August 2024, the 1st Applicant is a political party whilst the 2nd to 5th Applicants are the members of 1st Applicant. They brought this Application in pursuant to section 162 and section 163 of the Electoral Act, Act 5 of 2014. They sought the following orders from the Tribunal:

- a) Condoning the non-compliance with the rules of this Honourable Tribunal in so far as it may be necessary.
- b) That First and Second Respondents be directed to forthwith replace the name of the authorized representative from Nicanor Ndjoze to Mr John Shiwa Nghishekwa as the authorized representative of the First Applicant.
- c) Directing 3rd and 5th respondents to forthwith withdraw the party lists purportedly submitted on behalf of the first Applicant for purposes of section 73(1), (4) and section 77(1) of the Electoral Act, Act 5 of 2014.
- d) That first and second respondents be directed forthwith declare that by announcing third respondent as the democratically elected president in 2019 was false and unconstitutional and is set aside.
- e) Declaring the swearing in of the 3rd and 4th respondents as members of National Assembly unconstitutional, unlawful and therefore null and void.
- f) The Chairperson of the Electoral Commission of Namibia is hereby directed to announce a declaration as contemplated by section 75(1) and section 110(3) (b)
 - i) of the Electoral Act, Act 5 of 2014, that the following person are duly elected president and member of the National Assembly, with effect immediately, namely: Kandy Nehova.
- g) Directing the first and second respondents to forthwith publicly apologize to the first Applicant (RDP), its members and the electorate for the political and material harm caused by their actions endorsing illegitimate individuals.
- h) That first and second respondents be directed to forthwith refund the second Applicant the registration fees of N\$20 000-00 and N\$5000-00 paid to them during 2019 and 2020 election with interest.
- i) Award punitive damages against first and second respondents in favour of Applicants, the Applicants dignity were impaired, damaged to personality rights, Irreparable material damage to first Applicant.
- j) Granting the applicant's costs who may choose to oppose this Application.
- k) Granting the Applicant's such further and alternative relief as the Court may deem fit.

It is further argued that the Electoral Act does not grant the Tribunal the right to issue declaratory orders. The power to grant declaratory relief is one uniquely granted to the High Court in terms of section 16 of the High Court Act, Act 16 of 1990.

The Court found that a careful reading of Applicants Head of Arguments did not lead it to how and where this Tribunal derive the jurisdiction to hear adjudicate and decide on the reliefs sought.

That, it is not for the court to look high and low for the allegations and facts proving jurisdiction in the founding papers. In the instant matter the applicants did not establish jurisdiction in their pleadings nor in their head of arguments. What stated in the founding affidavit of Mr Hinamanye S. Nehova in paragraph 6 is only an averment that this Honourable Court has jurisdiction over the matter and it went silent.

However, during oral submissions, Counsel for the Applicants rely heavily on section 162(1) (d) that this Tribunal has the necessary jurisdiction. After the Court carefully studied the aforesaid provision, the Court were not convinced nor persuaded to believe that the application brought by applicants fit the definition.

The Court also found that the Tribunal has no necessary jurisdiction to hear, adjudicate and decide on the prayers as prayed for by the applicants. In result the application stands to be dismissed.

The Court found that the conduct of the applicants acted with malice which was frivolous and vexatious.

The following order was made:

- a) The application is dismissed on the basis that this Electoral Tribunal lacks the necessary jurisdiction on the reliefs sought.
- b) An order of costs is granted against Applicants no. 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. One instructing and one instructed counsel on an attorney and client scale.
- c) The reliefs sought are opposed by all Respondents.

5.1.2 Namibia Economic Freedom Fighters v ECN and another, Case No: HC-MD-CIV-MOT-GEN-2024/00381.

The applicant is a political party duly registered in terms of the Electoral Act 5 of 2014, as amended ('the Act'). It is common cause that the applicant failed to comply with the disclosure regime set out in s 139 of the Act, in relation to its assets and liabilities. It further failed to comply with its responsibilities in relation to filing necessary records and the audit of its financial statements as required by s 140 of the Act.

After a long interaction between the first respondent and the Electoral Commission of Namibia (ECN), which spanned over a number of years, with the latter calling upon the applicant to comply with its statutory obligations, the respondent eventually issued a letter dated 17 June 2024 deregistering the applicant as a political party. This was done in terms of s 152.

The applicant cried foul and approached the court seeking an order setting aside its de-registration. In the main, it contended that it had not been granted an opportunity to be heard by the respondent before the drastic step of deregistering it was made. The respondent claimed that it had accommodated the applicant for long enough and that it was entitled to deregister the applicant as it did and that this was in terms of the Act.

It was held that the urgency of a matter does not relieve the applicant's legal practitioner the abiding duty of presenting well-drafted papers, devoid of mistakes and carelessness.

The Court also found that the strict application of laws relating to standing to sue or be sued, should not constitute an impediment to parties seeking clarity on the questions of great moment in a constitutional state.

Furthermore, the Court found that the notice of motion is an essential part of the application, and it should thus be drafted with the presence of mind and with clarity. This is because at the end of the day, the document on which the order sought may be granted.

The disclosure regime provided for in the Act is to ensure that political parties are transparent in their activities and that they account for the public money given to them by the Government. Furthermore, they should disclose all their assets and liabilities so that they do not become a vehicle through which money laundering and other illegal activities are carried out.

The respondent should therefore not be unduly lenient in dealing with errant political parties as that erodes the confidence of the public in the electoral process. The applicable provisions, including the sanctions imposable, must be carried out fearlessly in order to meet the objectives of the Act.

It was also held that the respondent was incorrect in deregistering the applicant without having afforded it an opportunity to make representations before that critical step was taken.

In the end the Court ruled that whereas cases of non-compliance may differ in severity, because of the central role political parties play in Namibia's democratic dispensation, the respondent should first consider suspending funding to a political party in terms of s 159, rather than deregistering a party at the first instance. As a result, the application was granted with costs as prayed.

5.1.3 Dr. Panduleni Itula and 2 others v President of the Republic of Namibia and 32 others (A2/2024) before the Supreme Court of Namibia

The case *Itula and 2 others v President of the Republic of Namibia and 32 others (A2/2024)* before the Supreme Court of Namibia involved a challenge to the validity of the 2024 Presidential election. The applicants, Dr Panduleni Filemon Bango Itula, Bernadus Swartbooi, and the Landless People's Movement (LPM), sought to have the election results set aside, alleging that the election was unlawful due to irregularities and the extension of the voting period by Proclamation 34 of 2024.

Background

- i. The 2024 Presidential election was held on 27, 29, and 30 November 2024.
- ii. Dr Itula, a presidential candidate, challenged the election results, claiming that the election was marred by irregularities, including the use of unauthorized verification tablets, ineligible voters casting ballots, and the unlawful extension of the voting period.

- iii. The LPM and Mr. Swartbooi joined the challenge, focusing on alleged executive overreach and the violation of constitutional principles.

Main Allegations

- i. The applicants argued that Proclamation 34 of 2024, which extended the voting period to 29 and 30 November 2024, was unconstitutional and violated the Electoral Act.
- ii. They claimed that the extension disproportionately benefited regions with strong support for the ruling party, SWAPO, and that the President and the Electoral Commission of Namibia (ECN) acted beyond their powers.
- iii. The applicants also alleged that the extension was retroactive, and that the ECN and the President were “functus officio” (having exhausted their authority) after setting the initial election date.

Court's Findings

- i. The court found that the extension of the voting period was lawful and necessary to ensure that eligible voters who were unable to vote on 27 November 2024 due to logistical issues (e.g., shortage of ballot papers) could exercise their right to vote.
- ii. The court rejected the argument that the extension was retroactive, noting that voting on 29 and 30 November 2024 was a continuation of the election process and not a new election.
- iii. The court held that the President and the ECN had the implied power to extend the voting period under the Electoral Act, particularly in light of the constitutional duty to protect the right to vote.
- iv. The court dismissed the applicants' claims of discrimination, finding that the extension was limited to 36 polling stations where ballot papers had run out, and it was not feasible to extend voting to all polling stations nationwide.
- v. The court also rejected the argument that the ECN and the President were “functus officio”, stating that the doctrine did not apply to legislative administrative actions like the extension of the voting period.

Outcome

- i. The court dismissed the applications by Dr Itula, Mr Swartbooi, and the LPM, upholding the validity of Proclamation 34 of 2024 and the 2024 Presidential election results.
- ii. The court ordered that each party bear its own costs, citing the public importance of the case and the need to encourage constitutional litigation without deterring future litigants.

Conclusion

The Supreme Court of Namibia ruled that the extension of the voting period was lawful and necessary to protect the constitutional right to vote. The court found no evidence of discrimination or executive overreach and upheld the validity of the 2024 Presidential election. The applicants' challenge was dismissed, and no costs were awarded.

CHAPTER 7



7.1 FINANCIAL EXPENDITURE

7.1 FINANCIAL EXPENDITURE

During the 2024/2025 financial year, the Commission was allocated an appropriation amount of **Six Hundred and Thirty-Seven Million, Nine Hundred and Eighty-Three Thousand Namibian Dollars (N\$637,983,000)** as its operational budget. The total expenditure for the 2024/2025 financial year was **Six Hundred and Thirty-Four Million, Eighty-Five Thousand and Sixteen Namibian Dollars (N\$634,085,016)** representing the execution rate of 99.4%.

Out of that total appropriation amount, **Seventy-Two Million, Eighty-Four Thousand, Seven Hundred and Eighty-Five Namibian Dollars (N\$72,084,785)** was for personnel expenditure and **Five Hundred and Sixty-Five Million, Eight Hundred and Ninety-Eight Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifteen Namibian Dollars (N\$565,898,215)** for non-personnel expenditure.

Day-to-day operational expenditures amounted to **One Hundred and Seven Million, Six Hundred and Sixteen Thousand, Nine Hundred and Twenty-Five Namibian Dollars (N\$107,616,925)** while election operations expenditures of the Commission throughout all three phases of the electoral cycle (i.e. pre-election phase, election phase and post-election phase) amounted to **Four Hundred and Fifty-Eight Million, Two Hundred and Eighty-One Thousand, Two Hundred and Ninety Namibian Dollars (N\$458,281,290)**.

Funds allocated for personnel expenditure were mainly disbursed to payment of salaries and other allowances for ECN staff members while funds allocated for non-personnel expenditure were primarily spent, among others, on voters' registration and voter verification equipment, printing and advertisement, rental of regional offices for ECN Regional Staff, conduct of the 2024 General Registration of Voters and Presidential and National Assembly elections both locally and at all 35 Namibian Diplomatic Missions Abroad, as well as payment of election officials including vehicles secured from members of the public.

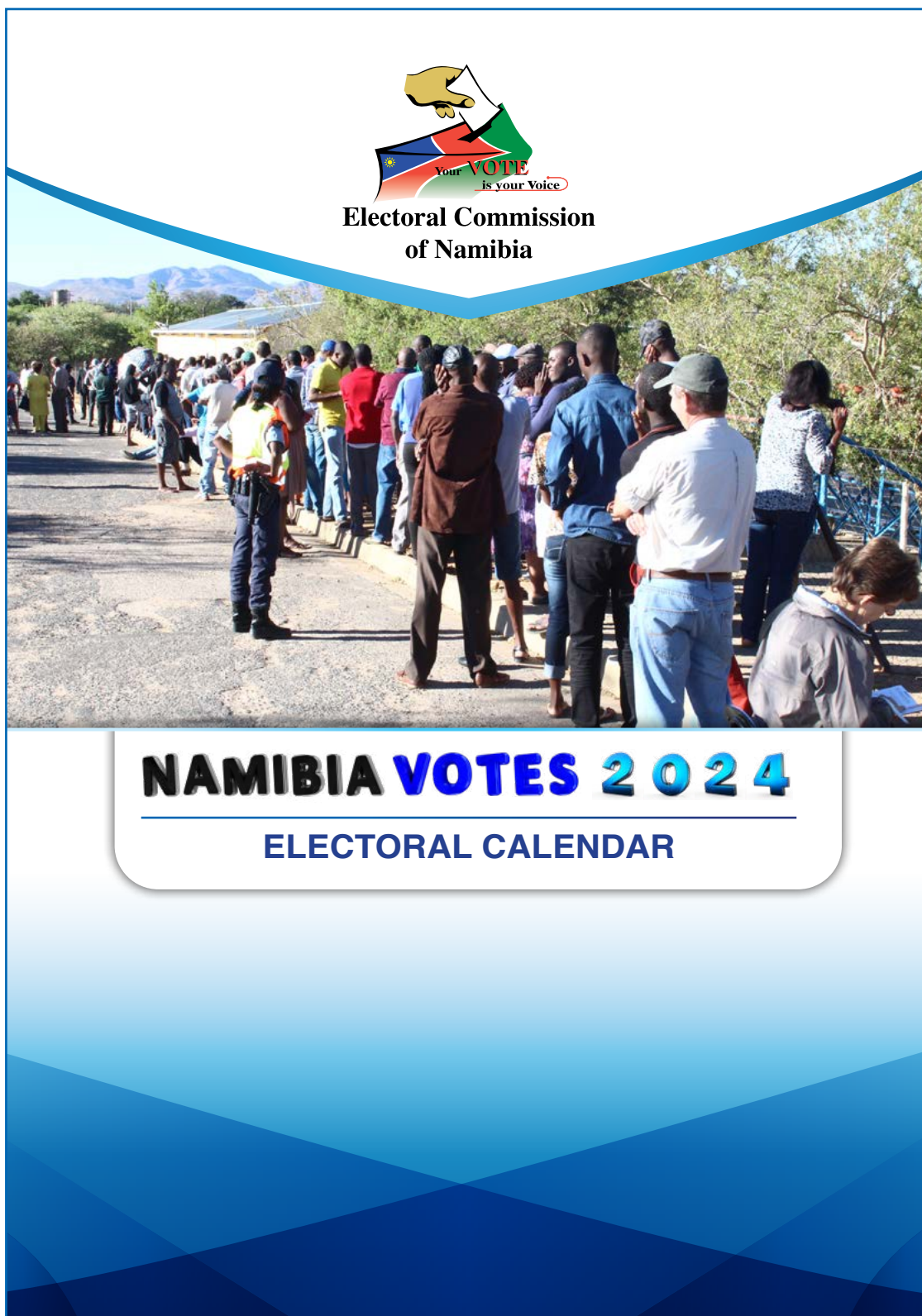

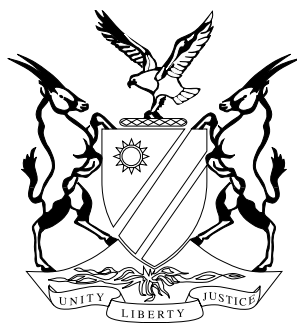

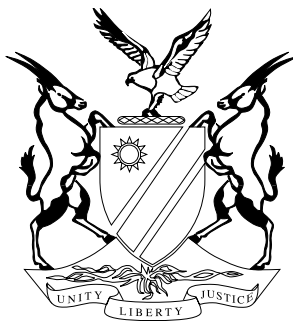
